

Trends Educational Research Methods In International Journals: A Comparison of European and Turkish Journals

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ABSTRACT

The use of methods and origins of researchers in international journals is very diverse. Both journals published in the western and eastern parts of the world. This research aims to examine trends in the use of methods and researchers' origins in international journals through the Education Resources Information Center (ERIC) media as the search center. In ERIC, there are two journals studied by researchers, namely the European Journal of Educational Research (EU-JER) which has 30 journals and the Turkish Online Journal (TOJ) which has 29 journals. To study it, researchers used Content Analysis. Content Analysis is a scientific analysis of the message content of a communication. Technically, the scope of content analysis includes; classification of signs used in communication, using criteria as a basis for classification, and using certain analytical techniques as a prediction maker. There are three conditions in content analysis, namely; objectivity, systematic approach, and generalization. The research results show that the trend in using research methods in the European Journal of Educational Research (EU-JER) is 50% using qualitative methods. Meanwhile, in TOJ, the trend in using research methods is the opposite of EU-JER, namely 48% quantitative. Meanwhile, 100% of the researchers at EU-JET come from Indonesia. Meanwhile, in TOJ the authors are a mixture of domestic and foreign writers. Domestically 69% and overseas 31%. The research results show that the trend in using research methods in the European Journal of Educational Research (EU-JER) is 50% using qualitative methods. This research aims to examine and analyze trends in the use of research methods in educational research published in international journals. By understanding these trends, we can gain better insight into how educational research continues to develop and how methodological approaches contribute to our understanding of complex educational issues. This research will involve the analysis of various research articles that have been published in international journals in recent years. In the process, we will evaluate the research methods used, emerging trends, and the potential influence of educational policy on the choice of research methods.

Published educational research, first; (Lisya Fiani Amalia and Anggraeni, 2021) explain that student research uses a lot of qualitative methods. Factors that encourage students to use this method include; previous students, supervisors, guidebooks, and colleagues. Second, (Nur Fajriani, 2021) research during the pandemic often uses qualitative research by design; case studies, descriptive qualitative, and phenomenological studies. Third, (Ripka Margaretha Ponggele and Dety Mulyanti, 2023) said that educational research in national journals uses more quantitative research. Fourth; (Maria Mintowati, 2020) explains that educational research on Mandarin study program students on the UNNES campus uses a lot of qualitative-descriptive research. Based on the results of the previous research above, research related to educational research methods in international journals is still relatively rare and difficult to find. Therefore, it is

important to conduct research on trends in the use of educational research methods in international journals, because it can be useful for mapping methods and themes that frequently appear in European and Turkish international journals. By understanding these trends, we can ensure that educational research remains relevant, effective, and responsive to changes in society and educational policy. Furthermore, this research can also provide guidance for educational researchers who wish to choose research methods that best suit their research objectives.

B. RESEARCH METHODS

This research is a qualitative descriptive research, because the results that will be obtained in the research are in the form of words which are the result of analysis in international journals. Primary data in this international journal research was taken from the Education Resources Information Center (ERIC) as the starting point for searching for international journals. Within ERIC there are various international journals. Of the various international journals contained in ERIC, there are two names of journals that are used as primary sources by researchers, namely; European Journal of Educational Research (EU-JER) and Turkish Online Journal (TOJ). When researchers searched for journals through ERIC with the keyword "Islamic Education in Indonesia", researchers found 30 journals in the European Journal of Educational Research (EU-JER). Meanwhile, in the Turkish Online Journal (TOJ), researchers found 29 international journals. To study the journals found in EU-JER and TOJ, researchers used Content Analysis. According to Noeng Muhadjir, Content Analysis is a scientific

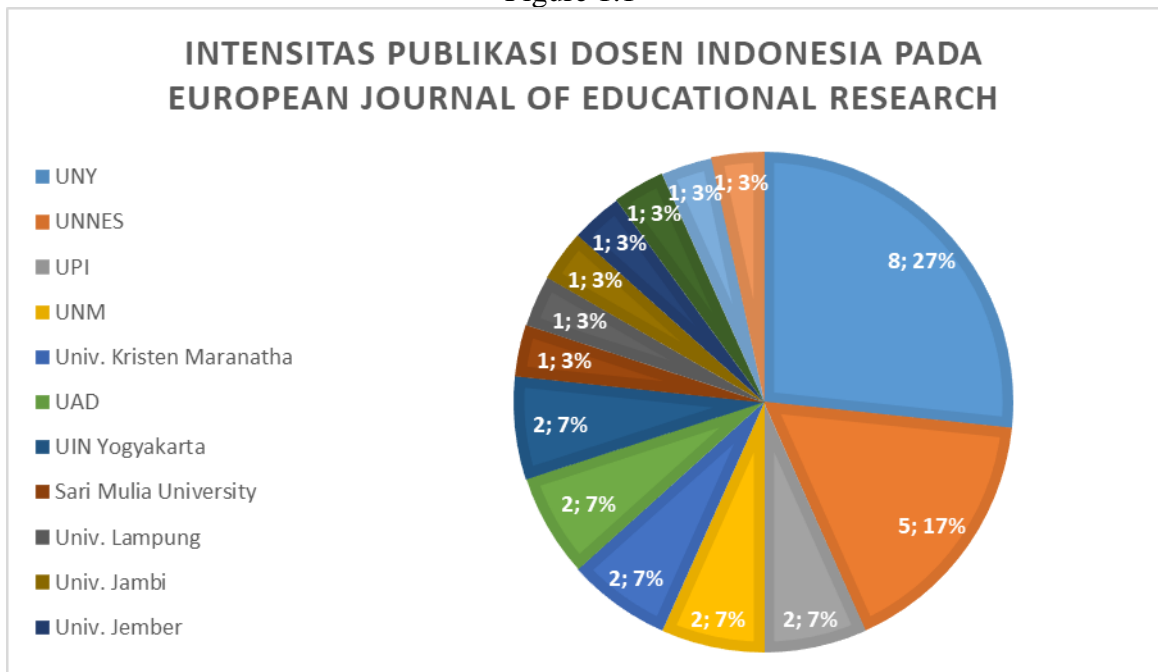

2. Discussion of Research Results

Indonesian lecturers' publications in international journals are very diverse. Among the studies described below are studies by Indonesian lecturers in European journals, especially the European Journal of Educational Research. From the research results presented above, there are 30

publications in the European Journal of Educational Research (EU-JER) through the Education Resources Information Center (ERIC) search media with the keyword Islamic Education in Indonesia, so the intensity can be explained as in the picture below :

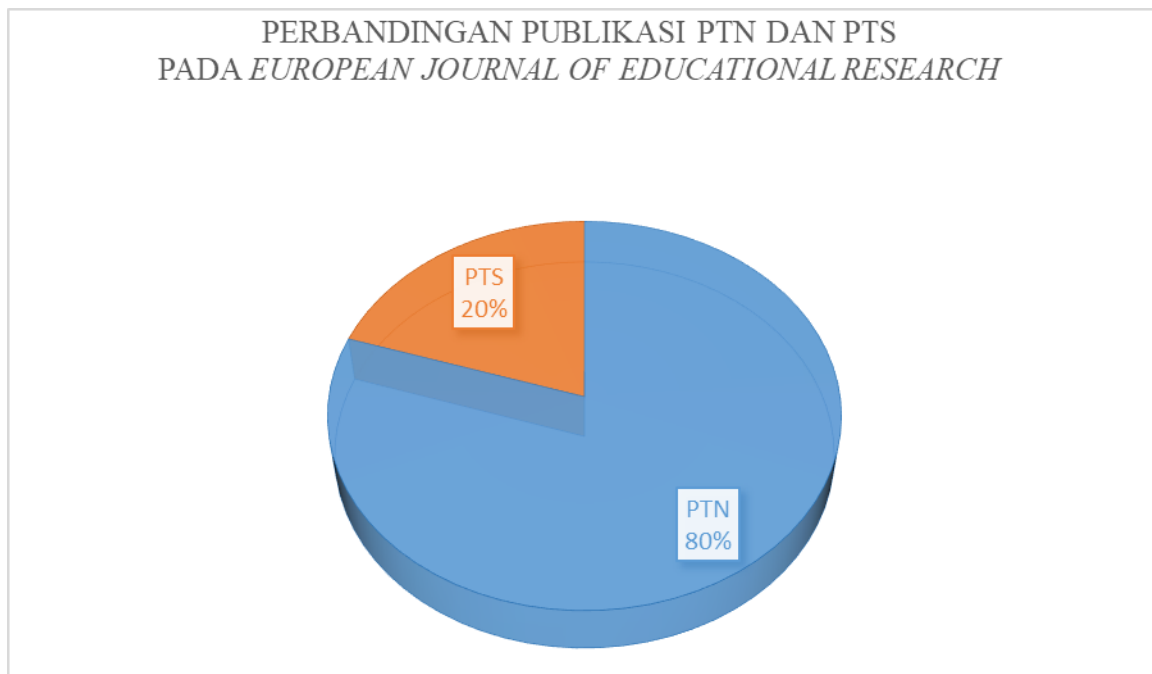

Based on the picture above, it can be explained that the lecturers who published

in the journals above, from the most to the fewest, apparently UNY and UNNES are in first and second place. Each; UNY 8 (27%) and UNY 5 (17%). The rest, such as; UPI, UNM, Maranatha Christian University, UAD, and UIN Yogyakarta each with 2 publications. Meanwhile, Sari Mulia University, Lampung University, Jambi University, Jember University, IAIN Kudus, Bachelorwiyata Tamansiswa University, and UIN Lampung each had 1 publication. From the results of this study,

the researcher wondered deeply in his heart, even though the international journal with Q3 is found in Europe, the authors actually come from Indonesian lecturers. Regarding why and how the results came to be this is not the focus of this research. Judging from the status of universities, State Universities (PTN) publish the most in the European Journal of Educational Research (EU-JER). Meanwhile, there are very few Private Universities (PTS). 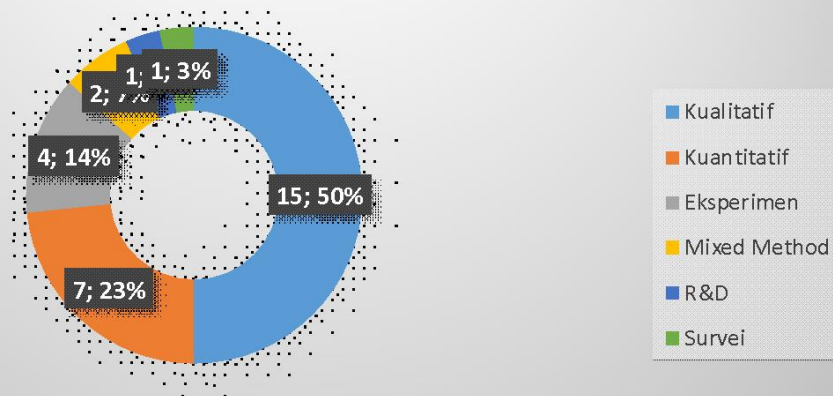

Trend Metode Penelitian pada European Journal of Educational Research



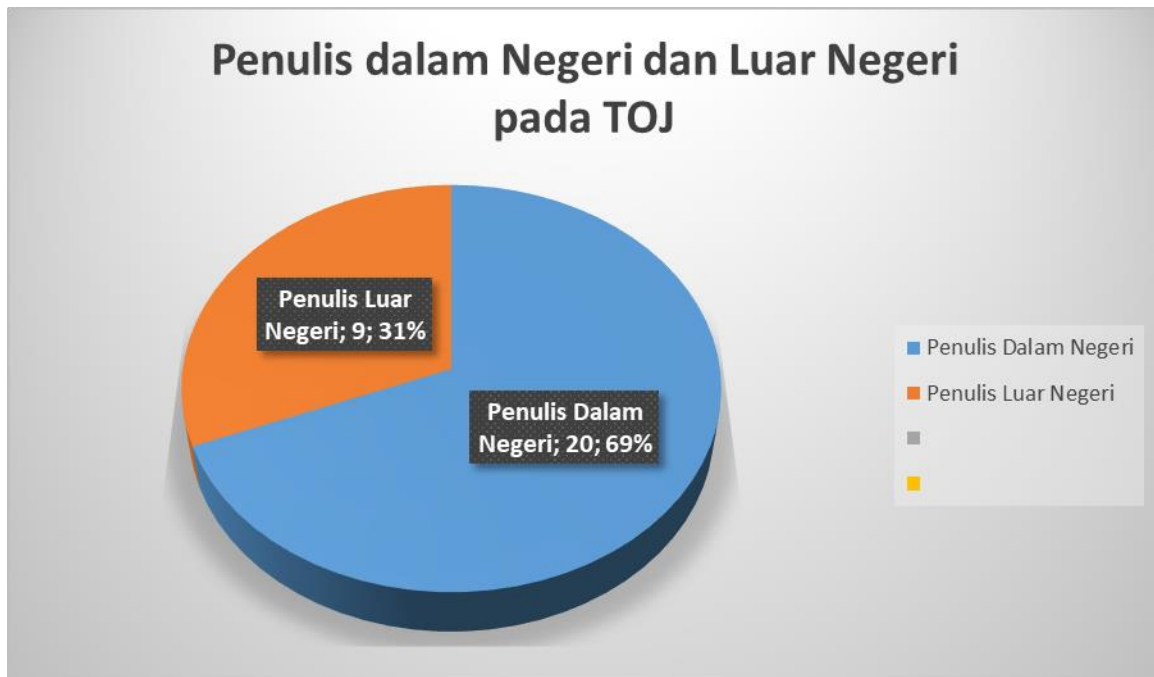

Based on the picture above, the trend of research methods used by lecturers who publish research results in the European Journal of Educational Research (EU-JER), in general is 50% qualitative and 23% quantitative. Meanwhile, 14% used the experimental method, 7% Mixed Method, 3% R&D, and 3% Survey. As for why and how the data from the research results came to this, that is not the focus of this research study. Hopefully in the future there will be other researchers who can study why 50% of the European Journal of Educational Research (EU-JER) journals use qualitative methods.

Meanwhile, in the Turkish Online Journal (TOJ) journal, after searching through the Education Resources Information Center (ERIC) media with the

keyword Islamic Education in Indonesia, 29 TOJ journals were found. Of the 29 journals obtained from TOJ, if detailed in detail there are two general categories, namely; domestic and foreign writers. Domestic writers come from; UT 10, UNM 2, Islamic Azad University, Iran 2, UIN Jakarta 1, UP Ganesha 1, Univ. Jambi 1, IPGM Malaysia 1, The Islamia University of Bahawalpur, Pakistan 1, Kondoa Islamic Secondary School, Tanzania 1, University of Wollongong, Australia 1, Univ. Negeri Surabaya 1, Abu Dhabi University, UAE 1, IPB1, UMS 1, Universiti Brunei Darussalam, Brunei 1, UAD 1, University of Tehran 1, and Univ. Gorontalo 1. There are fewer foreign writers compared to domestic Indonesian writers.

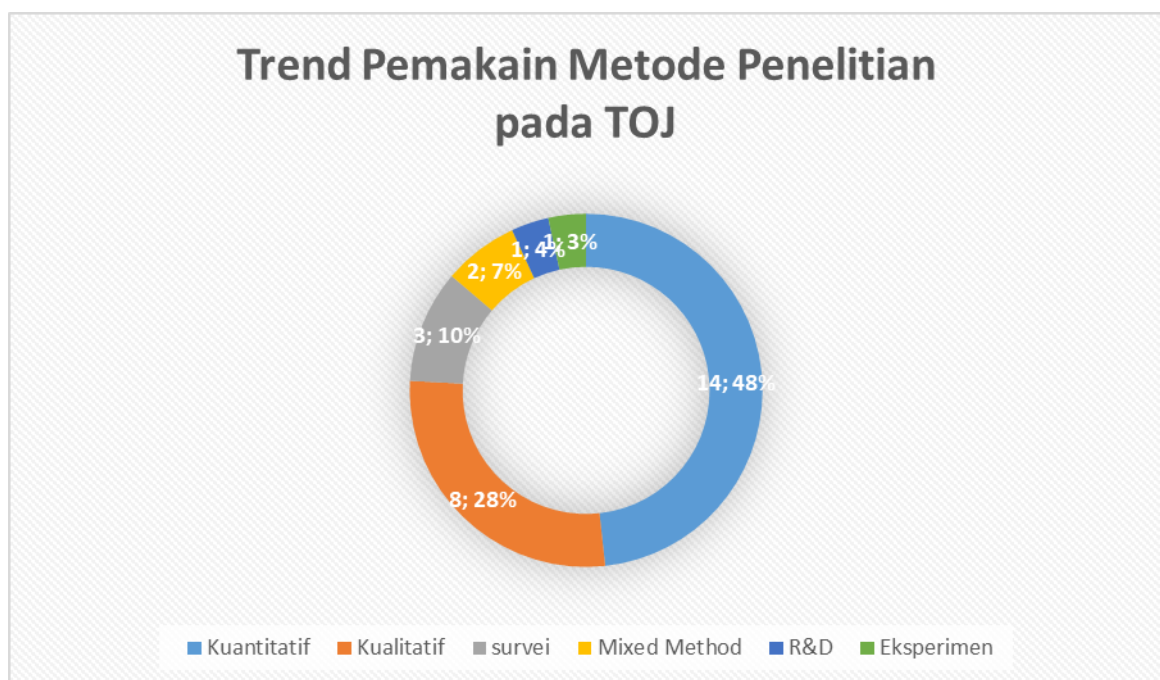

Based on the picture above, it turns out that TOJ still has more lecturer writers from Indonesia, namely; 20 journals with a percentage of 69% and 9 journals with

foreign authors with 31%. Meanwhile, the method used in TOJ can be explained in the image below.

Based on the picture above, the trend of method use in TOJ consists of; quantitative 14 journals or 48%, qualitative 8 journals or 28%, survey 3 journals or 10%, mixed method 2 journals or 7%, and R&D 1 journal or 4%, and experimental 1 journal or 3%. So, when compared between the Turkish Online Journal (TOJ) and the European Journal of Educational Research (EU-JER), both move in opposite directions. If EU-JER is 50% qualitative, then TOJ is different. TOJ is more the opposite of EU-JER, namely 48% quantitative. Judging from the researcher's point of view, 100% of EU-JER authors come from Indonesian lecturers. Meanwhile, in TOJ there are 20 journals or 69% from Indonesian researchers and 9 journals or 31% from foreign writers.

D. CONCLUSION

Based on the results of the discussion above, this research can be concluded that the trend of using research methods in the European Journal of Educational Research (EU-JER) is 50% using qualitative methods. Meanwhile, in TOJ, the trend in using research methods is the opposite of EU-JER, namely 48% quantitative. Meanwhile, 100% of the researchers at EU-JER come from Indonesia. Meanwhile, in TOJ the authors are a mixture of domestic and foreign writers. Domestically 69% and overseas 31%.

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
